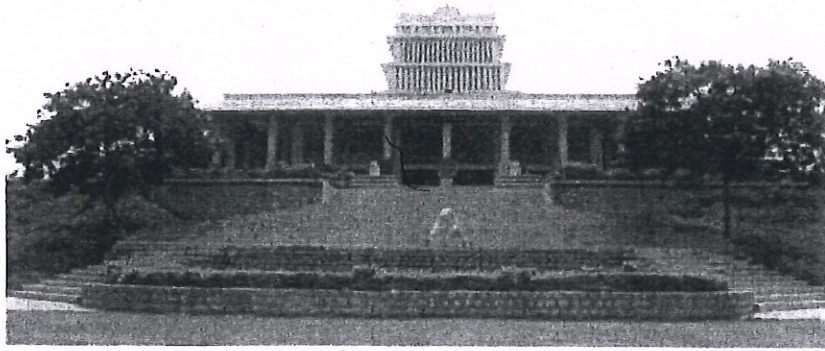



Day 1: 26/05/2016, Thursday

// Research is integral part of growth and expansion of social sciences. Its relevance is enhances much more in the modern, globalised society where development has attained additional dimensions. Social Science Research faces the challenge to thoroughly equip itself to meet the ever-growing needs of society that is transforming itself at a rapid pace. Often, demarcations (into rural, urban, caste, gender etc) are blurred by the advancement in technology and changing socio-economic scenario. Societal problems are assuming wide-ranging complexities. Under these circumstances, it is necessary to approach research from a preliminary and systematic understanding of the methods in social science research as an essential part of overall research processes as the methods and their interpretation has expanded enormously in their scope and application over a period of time.

The research methodology course, hosted by Hampi Kannada University for the very first time is an attempt to bring together Phd (Doctoral) students of various disciplines of social sciences to address the growing need for research in the Indian context.

Registration and other related logistical arrangements of the participants of the course were attended to by the Organizing Committee of the **Centre for Womens' Studies, HampiKannnda University**. A total of *35 participants from 20 universities across the country* attended the ten day research methodology course sponsored by ICSSR.

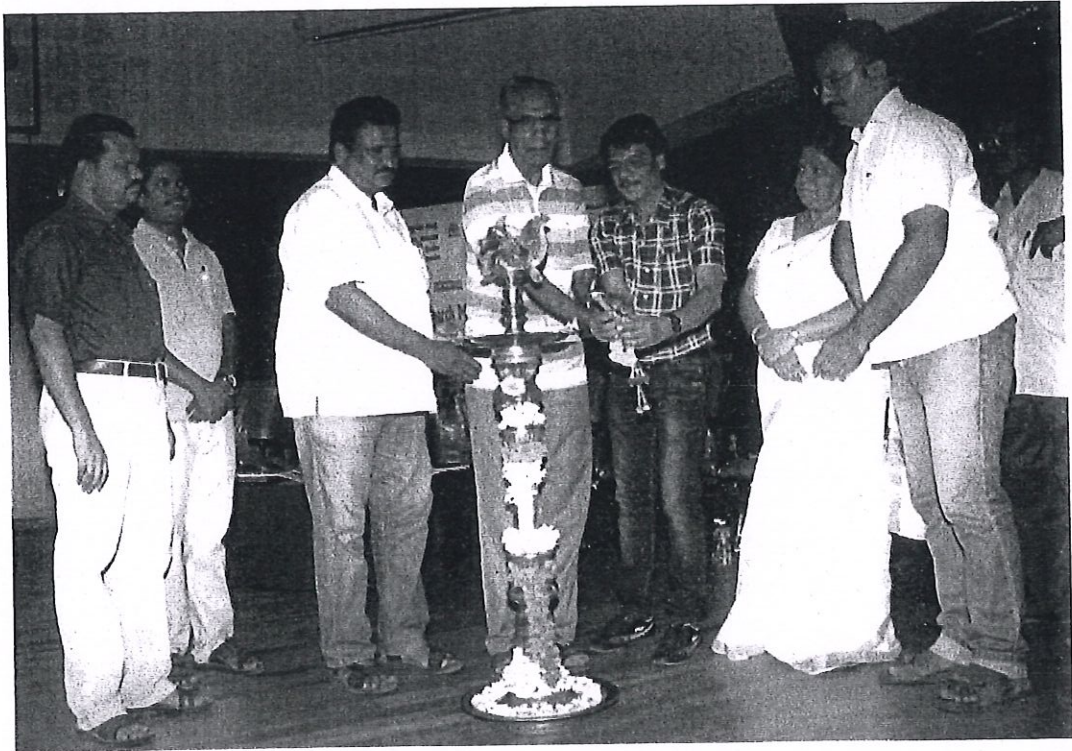



The Inaugural address was delivered by *Dr. Abdul Aziz, Chair Professor, Social Inclusion and Exclusion Centre, National Law School, Bengaluru*



Setting the tone for the course by addressing the basic foundations of social science research – definitions, trends, procedures and most importantly the present needs/scenario of such research in India. He went on to mention that post 1940's, with the establishment of UGC, the focus of

research shifted from academic discourse to field based research. He emphasized that in social sciences, that the overall society becomes the domain for a social scientist, meaning that the research lab becomes the society itself as opposed to physical sciences. Prior to UGC, a single dimensional approach was used in social science disciplines; later with experimentation the need to have an interdisciplinary approach was stressed upon and adopted. However, these experimentations were not entirely successful which pushed researchers to incorporate participatory methods into their research methodology processes. Social Science Research tends to have a focused approach but limited in its scope and application as it doesn't always go beyond the focal area and connect the dots with the larger functioning of societal processes. This is the gap that is seen in policy formulation and policy implementation.

Prof. Panduranga Babu, Registrar, Hampi Kannada University delivered the presidential address and advocated the importance of social science research processes for the reason that in methodology, an interdisciplinary approach is often merely discussed but not adopted effectively. He posed a very important question to the participant group on how researches are being conducted, asking them to further probe and understand that our biases, stereotypes and social construction are largely getting reflected in our researches and the need to critically reevaluate them has become the need of the hour for social science research in the country.

Dr. PMahadevaiah, Finance Officer, Hampi Kannada University was of the opinion that research is shaped largely by western knowledge systems. In the Indian context, it becomes less relevant as the indigenous and ethnical views of the people of the land are not being reflected. For this to be addressed, authentic researches through an Indian perspective portraying all realities needs to be approached in all disciplines of Social Sciences.

Dr. Manjunath Bevinakatti, Dean, Social Science, Hampi Kannada University mentioned that Social Science research is ignoring the cultural aspect of life. This is rendering stagnation of researches and research processes itself. Reflection of cultural element of communities is crucial and unique to Social Science Research.

Dr. Chandrashekar R.V, Course Director, Centre for Women's Studies, Hampi Kannada University expressed that a platform such as this course module develops and promotes scientific attitude amongst researchers. It helps bridge the gap between knowledge and ground reality.

Community concerns and social realities have to be understood through a scientific lens for establishing authentic research studies.

A hearty welcome was extended to all participants on behalf of **Dr. Shobadevi M.G, Director, Centre for Women's Studies, Hampi Kannada University** and wishing them luck for the entire stay of the course.

Dr. Yeriswamy, Research Associate, Centre for Women's Studies, Hampi Kannada University compered the function and extended thanks to all present.

Session 2 was facilitated by Dr. Abdul Aziz and held from 11.30a.m – 1.00p.m who continued from his address at the inauguration, putting before the participants on the process of identification of social problems, formulation/identification of researchable social issues, framing of research objectives, hypothesis and overall research methodology processes.



Session 3 was held post lunch from 2.00 – 3.00p.m delivered by Prof Sivanna. N, Professor, CPIGD, ISEC, Bengaluru on **“Tools of Data Collection”** He stressed the importance on preparation of questionnaire and the methods and procedures to be kept in mind in the formulation of such tools in research methodology processes.

Session 4 concluded as the last technical session for the day was held from 3.45 – 5.15p.m was also chaired by Prof Shivanna who provided the necessary and relevant information with regard to **“Case study Method”** employed in research methodology. Approaches, writing formats and ways of collecting relevant case studies in accordance to research designs.

Day 2: 27/05/2016, Friday

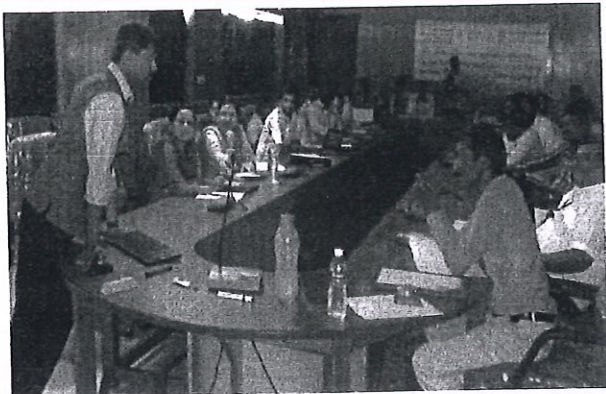

Dr. ShaukathAzim, Professor, Department of Sociology, Karnatak University, Dharwad facilitated *Session 6* on "*Participatory Research*" from 11.15a.m – 1.00p.m. Approaches to

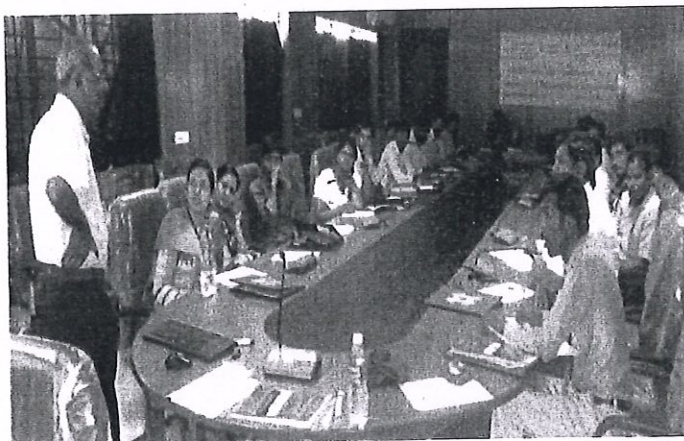


Research was explained with a clear distinction being drawn between Conventional and Participatory Research. The session focused on the mutuality of a two way process that is unique to such a methodology process with a very interactive session between participants and the facilitator. The use of Participatory Research in the present times is gaining

relevant importance so as to include the voice of the researched.

Dr Shaukath Azim continued with *Session 7* of day two, from 2.00 – 3.15p.m, with another very important concern in Research methodology processes – "*Women and Research*". This session stressed the relevance of sound feminist research methodology while researching women. The ethical implications, the deconstruction of bias agencies that we tend to follow in research needs to consistently learned and unlearned to reflect the authentic and real life situation and concerns of women in and outside the realm of research.

Session 8 was addressed by Prof. Y. J Rajendra on "*Action Research*" Processes from 3.45 –




5.15 p.m. He specified the functioning and linkages between three operating constitutional systems in the India – Conventional, Capitalistic and Democratic constitution systems, emphasizing the need for researchers to employ action research processes as an effective

tool to influence change for the people, of the people and by the people.

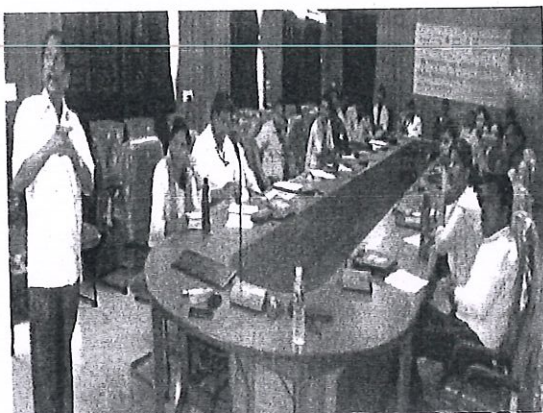

Session 9 was delivered by Dr. Ashok H.S, Professor, Department of Psychology, Bangalore University, Bengaluru between 9.45 – 11.15a.m. The focus of this lecture was centered on understanding the basics of **“Research design”**, the different types, challenges and ground realities in adopting specific designs and the relevance of using this systematized process in overall research methodology processes.



Between 11.30a.m – 1.00p.m., **Session 10** was delivered by Dr. C.G Laxmipathy, Associate Professor, Department of Sociology, VHD Central Institute of Home Science, Bengaluru on **“Critical Theory in Social Sciences”**.



The focus of this lecture was to put forth to the participants the fundamental theories used in sociological academic discourse and their relevance to overall research processes. He specified the importance of theorization in all disciplines of social sciences as critical to the engagement of research process itself.

This session on critical theory gathered much curiosity and interest amongst the participants to engage in discussions of the occurrence of past and current sociological phenomenon and its relevance to the different disciplines of social science research.

Post lunch, **Session 11** was continued by Dr. Ashok H.S who focused the lecture on **“Concepts in Research: Understanding Variables and Attributes”**. Much time was spent in this session between the facilitator and participants to gain clarity on the fundamental concepts in research such as variables, process of sampling and meaning of hypothesis. The session was held between 2.00 – 3.30p.m.

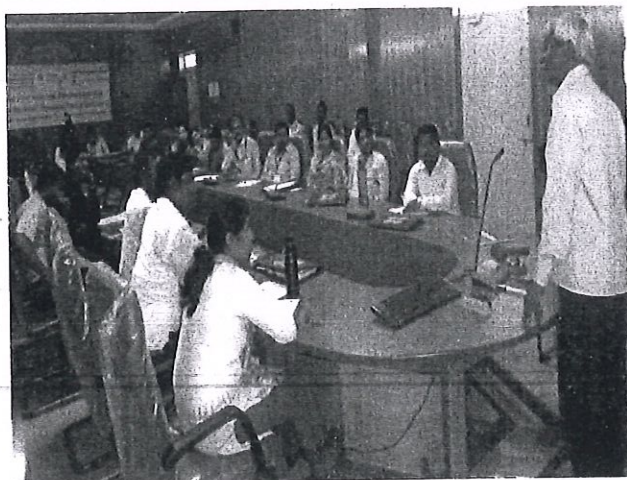
Session 12 concluded as the last technical session of the day was held from 3.45-5.15p.m and addressed by Dr. C.G Laxmipathy. This lecture focused on understanding of "**Subalternism**" and "**Subaltern Theory**". Discussions and debates were centered on the theoretical understanding of such a phenomenon and its relevance to social science research, especially to check the authenticity and representation of the voice of the researched and to be researched as opposed to being colored by the voice of the researcher in overall research processes.

Day 4: 29/05/2016, Sunday

Session 13 of Day 4 was also chaired by Dr. C.G Laxmipathy, titled "**Phenomenological/Theoretical Perspective**". This session helped participants by summarizing and concluding the understanding of different theories and the relevance of theorization in overall research processes. The necessity for the emergence and formulation of new theory is equally crucial to the research process for the generation and renewal of knowledge systems in our society, especially in the Indian context. The session was held between 8.00 – 9.30a.m.

Session 14 was held between 10.00 – 11.30a.m. by Dr Srinivas L, Associate Professor, Department of Anthropology, Kannada University, Hampi, This session titled "**Universe, Nature and types of Sampling**" was focused on Sampling, the types, size, frame, bias, error and understanding the overall sampling process. Discussions were held between the participants and facilitator to gain clarity on the use of sampling techniques in accordance to the research designs adopted.

Dr. K.M Metry, Professor, Department of Tribal Studies, Kannada University, Hampi



facilitated **Session 15** between 11.45a.m – 1.00p.m. The lecture titled "**Tribal Research trends in India**" was one that provided an adequate space and interaction for learning and unlearning the perception of tribal communities that researchers also have in India. He also traced the history of such research and the purposes it has rendered to over the period

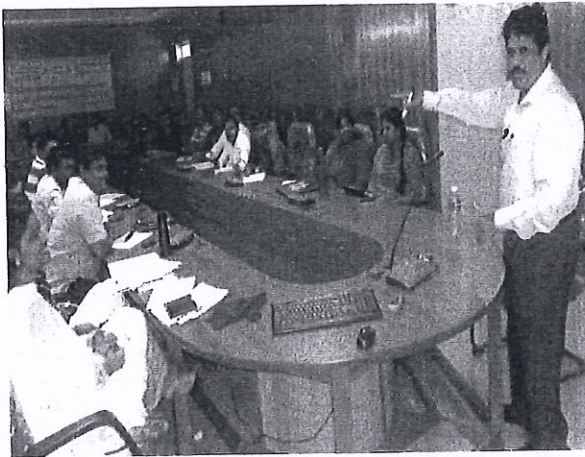

of time. Stressing the importance and necessity for more research to take place of indigenous communities which is not only merely participant but objective in nature to reflect the real, true to life social reality of ethnic original descendants of the land is crucial for the future of tribal research studies in India.

Post lunch **Session 16** was facilitated by Dr. Ashok H.S. delivering the session on "**Hypothesis**". He provided clarity on formulation hypothesis, framing of the hypothesis statement, types and testability factor of hypothesis. The session held between 2.00 – 4.00p.m also focused on a group exercise, here the participant group was divided in 5 teams and had to collectively arrive at researchable issues, statement of the research problem, title, variables and constructing hypotheses to gain a practical understanding of the hypotheses component of the course syllabus.

Session 17, the concluding session for the day was delivered by Dr. Lancy D'Souza, Associate



Professor and Head of the Department, Psychology, Maharaja's College, Mysore. This session was an introductory element to the statistical aspect of Research Methodology processes. The session titled "**Descriptive Statistics: Measurement of Central tendency**" The session work focused on Mean, Median and Mode and was held between 4.15 – 6.30 p.m.

Day 5: 30/05/2016, Monday

Session 18 of Day 5 also held between 8.00 – 9.30a.m by Dr. Lancy D'Souza, Associate Professor and Head of the Department, Psychology, Maharaja's College, Mysore. He continued with measures of central tendency – **Skewness and Kurtosis**. The session provided the participant group acquire the much needed clarity in understanding parametric and non-parametric data.

Session 19 titled "**Measurement of Correlation: Karl Pearson's Correlation and Rank Correlation**" Dr. Lancy D'Souza, Associate Professor and Head of the Department, Psychology, Maharaja's College, Mysore. threw light on concepts of correlation and regression were also

covered along with the practical aspect helping students understand the manual process of statistics first hand. It was held from 10.00 – 11.30a.m.

Session 20 was held between 11.45a.m – 1.00p.m by Dr. C.S Vasudevan, Professor, Dept of Ancient History and Archeology, Kannada University. The lecture titled "**Historical Method and Oral Tradition**" threw light on the methods and ways adopted during ancient times to record history and establishes the sources of information that we have accessibility to in today's world. Aspects of qualitative-ness were also broken down to understand how information came to being in this world with regard to communities. The importance of oral tradition as a carrier of information and passing it down on to generations within communities was stressed upon to be reflected and understood for research methodology processes.



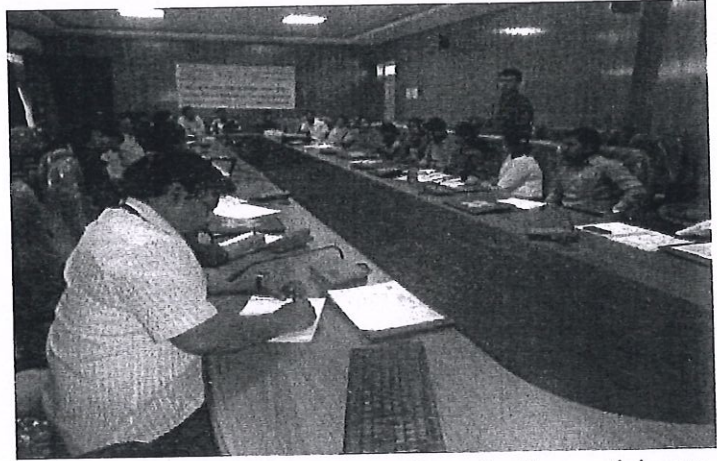
Post lunch **Session 21** by Dr Srinivas L, Associate Professor, Department of Anthropology, Kannada University, Hampi, was held between 2.00 – 3.30p.m. This session concluded the last of the statistics lecture series of the course. The session titled "**Analysis of Variance and Co-variance: One and two way classification**" was very useful to understand how to use ANOVA and ANCOVA in accordance to the output desired in different research designs.

Session 22 was held between 3.45 – 5.15p.m. The lecture titled "**Ethnographic Field work**" delivered by Dr. Shaik Abdul Aziz Sahib, Former Head, Department of Anthropological Survey of India, Dehradun was informative and essential to end the day with understanding participative-ness of field work study. Establishing the clear distinction between sociology anthropology and ethnography, he shared his vast field experience in anthropological field work and the necessity for adopting such a methodology to avail and understand the ground reality of communities to be reflected in research studies today.

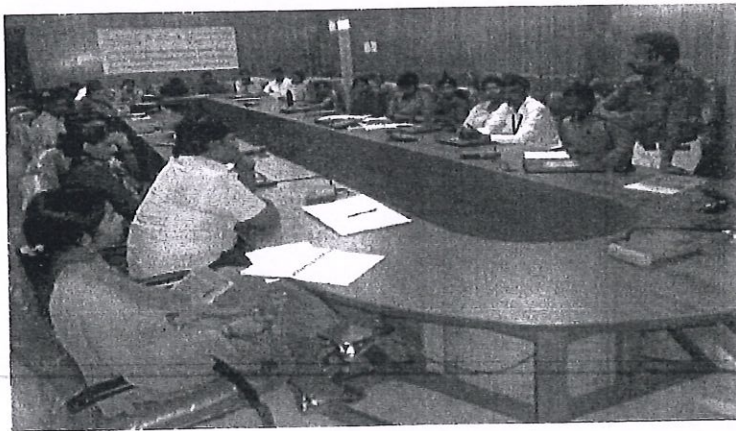
Day 6: 31/05/2016, Tuesday

Session 23 of Day 6 was held between 8.00-9.30a.m and facilitated by Dr. GovindRaju, Asst. Professor, Department of Sociology, Mangalore University. The session titled **"Qualitative Research: Quantitative method, data and results"**. This session stressed the importance of qualitative-ness during all stages of research, from the inception to the results. He provided relevant examples at each stage to be adopted to make research processes qualitative in nature.

Session 24 was held between 9.45 – 11.15a.m Dr. Kshitij Urs, Regional Director, Action Aid India. The session titled **"Community needs and Research gaps"** aimed at breaking down the reality of how researchers and overall society approaches the understanding of communities and their unique social factors that provide a rich base for research methodology processes in India. This session helped the participant group reflect and question the perception of communities research is reflecting or not reflecting in its overall methodology processes. It made the participants question who, why, what and by whom are researches being conducted, i.e., who is it really benefitting at the end of the day.



Session 25 was held from 11.30a.m – 1.00p.m by Dr. Govind Raju, who continued the session

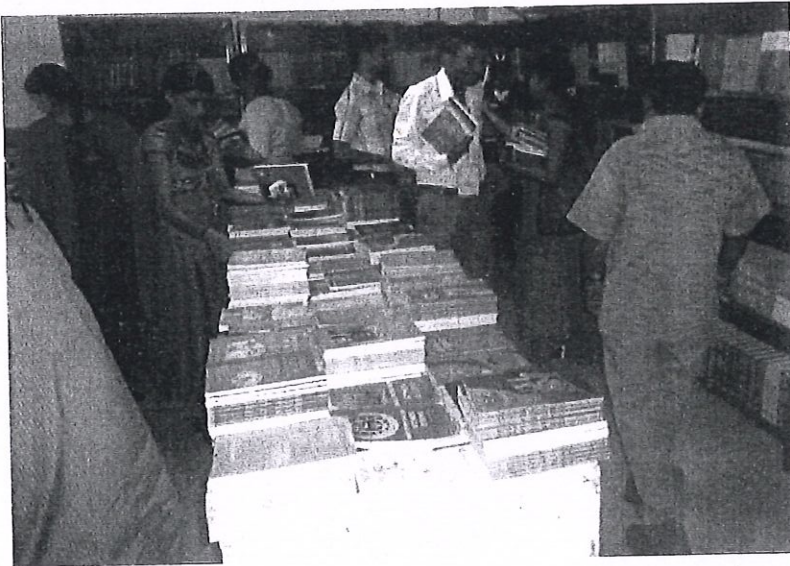


on qualitative research. This session was interactive as the participant group was able to put forth their understanding of rendering a qualitative aspect at all stages of research methodology by sharing their research experiences. The second

part of the session titled *"Types of Research"* did not merely summarize the types but was open to discussion to incorporate the understanding the participant group to render quality at all stages of research, the skills adopted, the tools used and reporting style.

Post lunch *Session 26* was continued by Dr. Kshitij Urs and held from 2.00 – 3.45 p.m. The session titled *"Social Science Research and Policy Making"* aimed at breaking down and understanding the nuances of policy making and formulation, the anthropology of policy making in India is and how inclusive it renders itself for all stakeholders involved, such as policy that is aimed at the marginalized should reflect the voice and active participation of the said group in question. The discussion was interactive as it got the participant group to discuss crucial issues addressing exclusion and marginalization and how as researchers, this gap can be filled by following sound research methodology processes and exploration of truth as it is. Sharing relevant examples of governmental policies that are exclusive of the subaltern voice was shared to provide a real life picture of policy making and the importance of the functioning Governance in democratic social systems.

Session 27 was held at 4.00 p.m, whereby the participant group and facilitators present visited *Prasaranga*, situated near the library on the University Campus. This session was included on



request and initiation by the overall group itself as Kannada University is known for its rich resources in academic/research publication material. These materials are available in Kannada, Hindi and English. The group also spent some time in the University Library referring to thesis material, post which

they got into their groups to discuss research proposals for the field work component of the course.

Day 7: 1/06/2016, Wednesday

Session 28 of the course started at 8.00a.m and chaired by Dr. R.V Chandrashekar. Here, the participant group which was split into smaller teams who presented research proposals to the overall group. This exercise aimed at providing a practicum experience for the group, was done so that the participant group can understand the nuances, limitations and challenges that come by during research methodology processes. Certain focus areas were selected and the group decided to formulate an Interview Schedule for the field visit scheduled on 2/06/2016.

Session 29 was held between 9.30 – 11.00p.m. by Dr. Puttuswamiah. S, Asst. Prof, Department of Economics, Bangalore University. This technical session covered concepts of “*Research Design*” such as essentials of a good design, classification, nature and types.

Session 30 was continued by Dr. Puttuswamiah from 11. 30a.m – 1.00p.m throwing light on “*Report writing in Social Science Research*” – the different types, functions, principles of writing, styles of outlining, documentation, bibliography and references.

Session 31 was held between 2.00 – 3.30p.m. This session was facilitated by Prof. P. Venkata Rao, Professor, Dept. Of Anthropology, Central University of Hyderabad “*Survey Research and Questionnaire*”. He provided the group with clarity by helping trace the history of surveys, their uses, types, advantages and limitations. He further provided the basis that “*No survey is better than its questionnaire*” meaning that questionnaire as a tool is crucial in collecting specific kinds of data. Linking the supplementary and supportive processes that is essential in formulation of an effective questionnaire in order to conduct an equally effective survey was stressed upon.

Session 32 was also facilitated by Prof. P. Venkata Rao, Professor, Dept. Of Anthropology, Central University of Hyderabad on “*Interview Method*”. This session of course module provided clarity in the difference between Interview and Questionnaire – its uses, formulation, advantages, limitations and purpose. This interactive session was highly beneficial for the students as a practical understanding of how to use the above tools of data collection was acquired with discussions centered on research topics across the different disciplines of social sciences. This, being the concluding session for the day was held between 3.45 – 5.15p.m.

Day 8: 2/06/2016, Thursday

Session 33 of Day 8 of the course started very early with a visit to Hampi town to visit the



ancient historical temples that is unique to the picturesque town of Hampi. Dr. Yarriswamy E, Research Associate Centre for Women's Studies, Kannada University, Hampi. This session was unique to the overall group experience as it provided the group with an historical as well as anthropological understanding of the place. This initiated many discussions and interactions amongst the participants


about their own places of origin and the many socialisms and cultural-isms that shape them through the course of time and places.



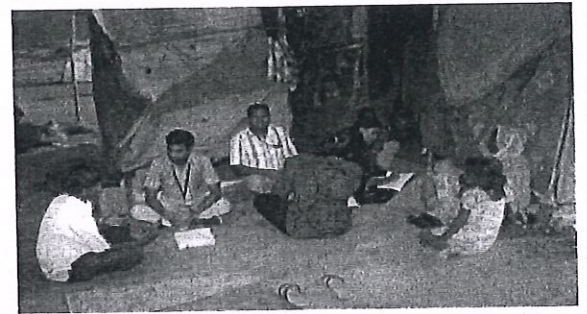



Day 9: 3/06/2016, Friday

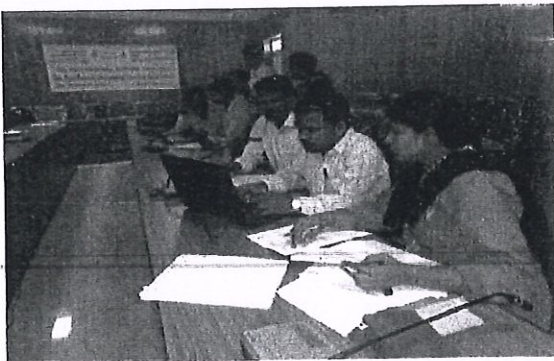
Day 9 of the course was allotted for the SPSS component of data analysis processes in research methodology. It started at 9.00a.m to 3.30p.m. There were a total of three technical sessions conducted for this component of statistical analysis of research methodology processes.

Session 37 titled "*Introduction to SPSS*" by Mr. Mahalingaiah M.R, Researcher, NIMHANS,



Bangalore provided the conceptual understanding of the use and advantages of the statistical software. He specified the purposes and the ways to incorporate statistical analysis with the use of the software into different research studies.

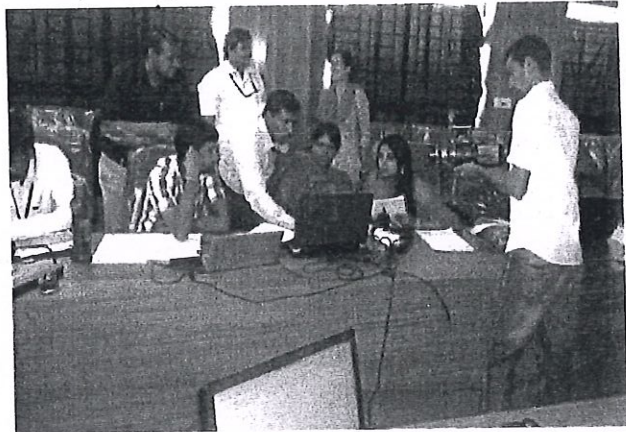
In **Session 38** titled "*SPSS Practical and Data Entry*", the participant group was divided into



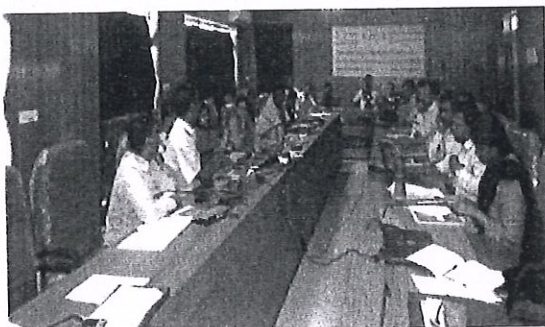
four smaller teams and entered the data collected on the field from the previous day. This exercise helped the participants understand the gap in tool formulation, ways of formatting questions, data entry processes in terms of understanding the definition of variables etc. This session helped

eliminate many of the doubts in manually entering data into statistical software.

For *Session 39, "Data Analysis"* focused on understanding basic tabulation and cross tabulation processes. For the participant group, this session tied together the concepts held during the course of the day. From coding of variables to input of data and understanding how output can be generated in accordance to the research study was clearly distinguished.



Session 40 as the concluding session for the day was facilitated by Dr. Chandrashekar R.V titled "*Philosophical Foundation of Social Sciences*" and was held between 3.30 – 5.45p.m. This session traced the establishment of knowledge systems in the field of social sciences that we know today. The philosophies of western writers and their contributions to the understanding of




social sciences is important to trace to understand the existence and challenging of knowledge systems. Concepts such as enlightenment, skepticism and reformation were discussed. The role of the church was discussed as it played the pivotal role to social reformation in early society. An interactive discussion to understand

philosophical foundations in India was touched upon.

Day 10 of the course marked the end of the ICSSR Research Methodology course. *Session 41* was held between 9.00 – 11.30a.m. This was facilitated By Dr. R. Indira, Retd Prof, Department of Sociology, University of Mysore. Delivering a lecture on "Feminist Research Methodology: Theory and Practice". This session threw light on understanding Feminism as an ideology, as a discourse and as lived realities through a gender perspective. Practice of Feminist Research is not a fixed methodology nor is it a fixed theorization process. Understanding and exploring

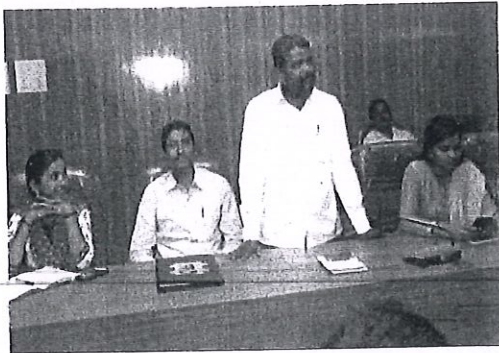

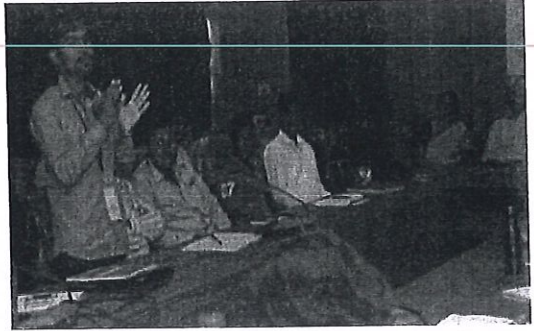


Venktramppa, Department of Development Studies, Hampi Kannada University opined that while the course work for Phd provides the basic

what they should do or shouldn't do. People consciously as well as unconsciously reinforce gender roles creating discrimination in society.



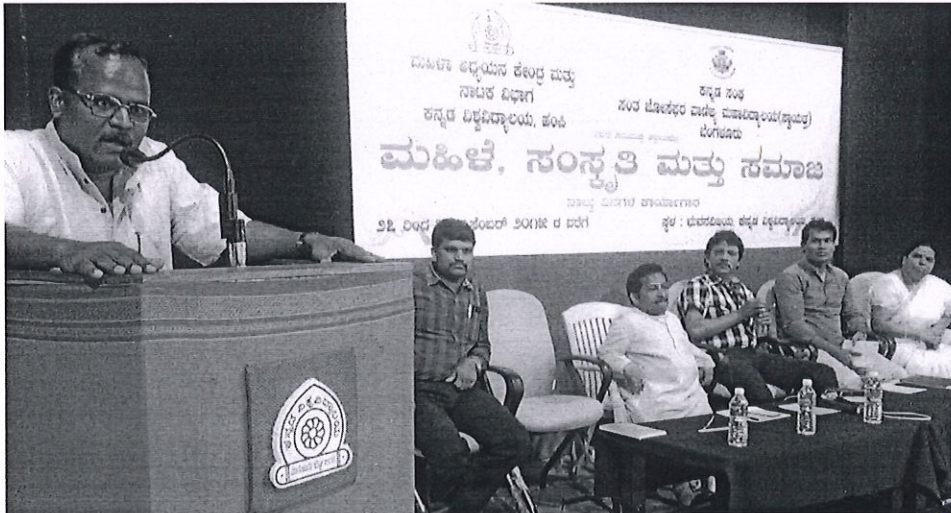

Although we knows that woman's hand hangs world cradle, but men wants weigh the cradle of the house only this is vow of patriarchy system. So we have come to today's system. They should be limited to family-centered women's responsibilities. Our women are demand of equality, which we can handle politically with the family. Women do not want to leave the family to deal with politics. The mother who can see the family responsibly, she can see the whole world.

From historically women have made the state equal to men. Potentially governed. Fighting in the battlefield equally. There are women who have built up their children back to war. Women are there in battlefield, family, social and political system also. Such women have not been able to enter the political spectrum at the expected level. There are many reasons for this. Women are not welcome in non-political areas. No one has put the red carpet for women to welcome them. There are curious questions about how a few women politicians came in the tragedy. Women Only survive in her life and in all areas whether woman is strong. People believe women if they speak honesty and confident. There is a identity of women. Sashikala said,

Mallika S Ghanti presided the programme and Speaking on the occasion, first generation of women politicians spoke, this shows way of next generation women politicians. Therefore the program was organized. Even the experiences of wives of success men's politicians are to be heard. It is a difficult task to get rid of the obvious belief that the politics is men's field and households work is women. In the history of Karnataka politics, men have been have been able or achieved in politics, how women/wives handled their men it should be know.

Women's experiences are different that come with politics in support of the strongest force. We have the problems that should be addressed by party-based politics, or whether women should begin politics within a female centric base based on intellectual understanding.
